## Homage To Our BBYO Leaders And A Little History

Do you know the dreidels we give to students on the day of their B'nai Mitzvah? As the teens usually remember to say, they are a gift to the Bar or Bat Mitzvah student in hopes that they will join one of our two official BBYO chapters, Dreidel AZA or Oakland BBG. These kids, every Wednesday night from 7-9 and most Saturday nights as well, provide a safe place for Jewish teens to socialize and participate in Jewish programming for TBA kids as well as kids across the East Bay.

There is a long and short history to all that.

When I arrived here in 2001, we had no teen programming at TBA at all. One of the first actions I took was to start a youth group. USY is the official youth group of the Conservative movement, but given that there were few functioning USY chapters in the Bay Area and that the main purpose of the group was to meet Jewish teens, we decided to form a BBYO group instead. BBYO used to stand for B'nai B'rith Youth Organization but spun off independently some years ago. It is non denominational, not affiliated with any particular movement of Judaism. I sensed that if we could just get it started, it would run on its own, and, while membership has ebbed and flowed, it has succeeded beyond my imagination.

Credit goes especially to the teens who led it from the beginning, Devi Margolin, Josh Rego, and Jake Moore. We started as a combined BBYO chapter, with the guys division (AZA) and the girls (BBG) together. After 2-3 years they split into separate chapters, Dreidel AZA and Oakland BBG. Since that time, we have had so many of our kids go on to lead the chapters as well as serve on the Regional and International Boards, including my own kids.

Credit also goes to many of our members who served as Advisors, including Howard Zangwill, Becca Posamentier, David Levin, Jo Ilfeld (whose daughter, Miri, currently serves on the Regional Board), Steve "Fanny" Fankuchen, and the Godfather himself, Alan Silver. Alan also served as the Regional President when he was a teen, as did Bryan Schwartz, Jason Finkelstein, Alex Finkelstein, and myself.

But the history of BBYO at TBA goes back much further. The original Oakland BBG was the second chapter ever created by BBG, all the way back in 1944. The current Oakland BBG reinstated that official number and call themselves Oakland BBG #2. The official AZA song, called "Up You Men," was written by Wes Bercovich, part of the Bercovich family which founded Temple Beth Abraham. In the early 1950's, when the school building was built, there were at least 7 BBYO chapters in the East Bay, as each made donations and appear on the clay plaques on the side of the building, Oakland AZA, Oakland BBG, Berkeley BBG, Henry Monsky BBG, Jewish Eden Teens (JETS) BBG, Nathan Harry Miller AZA, and Pacific AZA. All those chapters folded, as did Sam Ladar AZA and Sam Clar AZA in Oakland, but Dreidel AZA #2525 and the reconstituted Oakland BBG #2 proudly carry on the legacy.

I would encourage you to peek in some Wednesday, when there are usually over 50 kids here, sharing in community and, well, being teenagers. But we should be very proud that Temple Beth Abraham is filled with this youthful teen vibe. May it continue for years to come...

## The Important Role of Young People at TBA

The passage of time is a funny thing. My wife, Caren, and I joined the temple in 2008 after an extensive search that included many ideas about what our hypothetical children might need from a religious community. TBA felt like a spiritual home to both of us and a good potential home for those hypothetical children based on the importance TBA placed on child involvement.

Regardless of a child's age, there is a way for them to actively participate in TBA. Starting from Shabbat Mishpacha, the parent-led Shabbat morning service for our smallest children, they are an integral part of the service—not just receiving the wisdom of their parents but also taking part in the service itself.

This active role grows as a child "graduates" up to T'fillat Y'ladim where they help with the service and have the chance to be up close and personal with the Torah. We did not stay with that service as long as we could have, as the upward push from Ezra, our youngest, who, after his big brother Tate was old enough, would settle for nothing less than Junior Congregation bingo and being "in" on the expected responses to the longstanding jokes. (If you are not thinking "but the earth is round," you should be.)

In time, you realize this is all carefully crafted to lead to the most amazing part. Not only do our children stand and chant Torah in a room full of family and friends to mark their b'nai mitzvah, but even more impressively, many come back and chant Torah before the whole congregation for the High Holidays. Our sanctuary is big, and hundreds of families show up. That's a lot of people they don't know in a room that is likely standing room only. Just a few years after they were marching around the courtyard with a plush Torah for Shabbat Mishapcha, teens are helping lead the most important services of the year.

We have the privilege of raising a tween and teen born into this community. It was emotional, not just at Tate's Bar Mitzvah but at each of the steps that came before it. The integration of our youth into every part of the community is a big part of what makes TBA so special. At the Thursday minyan before a B'nai Mitzvah, we ease our almost adults into their next stage in the community by having the Minyanaires be present for donning tefillin and the first Aliyah. Because even though we are pushing these kids out into the world, we are doing it in a thoughtful manner that builds their skills and confidence.

It is wonderful to have a community dedicated to raising our children to take their place in Jewish society.

## A New Moses for Oakland Unified Jewish Staff

It was a Friday at lunchtime in late October 2023 when my phone rang. It was Lisa Spielman, my friend and colleague at Oakland Unified School District.



"We need to put together a list of the Jews who work at OUSD," Lisa declared.

Something inside me hit the brakes. The words "list" and "Jews" is never a great pairing in my mind.

"Lisa's being paranoid," I thought, "what do we need a list for?"

Eight hours later, Lisa sent me and a handful of Jewish colleagues the text of the first Oakland teacher's union

statement on the Israel-Gaza war. Just 20 days after the Hamas attacks on Israel, the statement condemned the entirety of Israel as an illegal occupation and championed the rights of teachers to teach anti-Semitism curriculum.

Lisa, a district director who has worked at OUSD since 2002, had already moved into action. Lisa and elementary school principal Jessica Cannon quickly amassed a list of 100 Jewish staff members and invited them to the first gathering of Jewish faculty and staff on November 13.

"I remember thinking that we needed to find every Jewish employee that we possibly could because it seemed like times were going to be very difficult for Jewish staff at OUSD," Lisa recalled.

The group Lisa and Jessica formed became an anchor for Jewish staff battered by anti-Israel activity at work. In November, teachers shared their feelings of betrayal as union leadership passed a virulently anti-Israel resolution. They also compared notes: a colleague who showed middle school students graphic images from Gaza as part of a lesson on Israeli aggression; anti-Israel posters in an elementary school faculty lounge; a middle-school administrator who posted antisemitic memes on social media.

"I was feeling shocked, hurt, and very, very alone after October 7th," says Sarah Rothe, a TBA member and Oakland Unified social worker. The Jewish staff group "was there to listen when we needed to cry and to push back against the tidal wave of antisemitism that at times made me feel like I was drowning."

Throughout the fall, Jewish parents also sought Lisa's guidance, turning to her for advice when their student's high school chemistry teacher turned their lesson plans to Gaza or their child's middle school teacher hung "From the River to the Sea Posters" in their classroom. "I received hundreds of texts and phone calls," Lisa says.

By December, the Jewish faculty group turned to action, collecting 60 signatures for a letter asking district leadership to intervene against an unsanctioned teach-in organized by anti-Israel teachers. In April, the Jewish faculty group met with district leadership, including OUSD superintendent, Kyla Johnson-Trammell. Among the group's requests: that district leaders set and enforce high standards for teaching Middle East curriculum.

"Lisa has shown us that we have a voice to be reckoned with," says TBA member and OUSD Kindergarten teacher Lori-Jill Seltzer, "and that there is light at the end of the dark tunnel."

## **Cool Summer Salads**

True confession time. I am not much of a salad person. However, when weather turns warm, nothing helps me keep my cool (and keep my kitchen cool) like a salad.

Here are two chopped salad favorites of mine based on two Jewish-themed sandwiches: the Reuben and lox and bagel.

The dishes have roots in American foodways. A chopped salad probably traces back to the Cobb or chef salads of the 1920s and '30s. The creation of the first Reuben sandwich is contested, but all stories seem to point to a Jewish deli in the first part of the 20th century. Whether it was in New York or Nebraska is up for debate.

The history of lox and bagels is more complicated. Bagels are a traditional Ashkenazi food, but it took the advent of commercial production of cream cheese and the shipping of cheap brined Pacific salmon to the East Coast to bring the elements together.

The Reuben sandwich has many variations but usually incorporates Russian dressing, sauerkraut, onions, Swiss cheese and corned beef on rye bread. My adaptation, the Reuven Chopped Salad, makes the combo kosher by replacing the cheese and dairy Russian dressing with a creamy, nondairy dressing that also incorporates the sauerkraut. Since I love pastrami, I use both it and corned beef in the salad. (I like the extra spice the pastrami brings to the party, which is why I call it a Reuven instead of a Reuben salad. Use all corned beef or all pastrami if you prefer.) The rye croutons help recreate the sandwich's taste and texture.

The Lox and Bagels Chopped Salad has a whipped cream cheese dressing. Do not substitute regular or soft cream cheese. I use "everything" seeded bagels for the croutons, but any savory, seeded or plain bagels will work.

Start with the Chopped Salad Base and then make your choice of salads, Reuven or Lox and Bagels. Both salad dressings can be made in advance and refrigerated. Allow them to come to room temperature and stir well before using.



CHOPPED SALAD BASE

For 1 salad

- 1 large head romaine lettuce
- 2 medium tomatoes
- 1 small, peeled cucumber
- 3 Tbs. finely chopped red onion

Rinse lettuce, drain and dry well. Chop into 1/2-inch pieces. Cut tomatoes in half across the widest part and squeeze out and discard liquid and seeds. Chop into 1/2-inch pieces. Chop cucumber into 1/2-inch pieces. Toss all together with onions.

#### REUVEN CHOPPED SALAD

Serves 4 as a main course

- 1 clove garlic
- 1 recipe chopped salad base (see recipe above)
- 4 oz. deli style corned beef
- 4 oz. deli style pastrami
- 4 slices rye bread (preferably dark rye with caraway seeds if possible)
- 1 recipe Reuven salad dressing (see below)
- 1 large dill pickle cut into 8 spears, optional

Cut garlic in half and rub inside a large salad bowl. Discard garlic. Add chopped salad base. Separate meat slices and cut into 1/2-inch strips. Toss with salad base. Cut bread into 1/2-inch cubes and toast in oven for croutons. Just before serving, toss salad with croutons and dressing. Serve with pickle spears.

Reuven salad dressing: Mix 1/2 cup mayonnaise, 1/4 cup ketchup, 1/2 cup chopped, drained sauer-kraut, 2 tsp. sauerkraut juice from package/jar or lemon juice, 2 tsp. jarred, prepared white horseradish (pick a brand made without cream usually found in the refrigerator or deli section), 1/4 tsp. ground black

pepper, 1/2 tsp. coarsely crushed caraway seeds (optional) and 1 tsp. or to taste Sriracha or other hot sauce. Combine and taste. Adjust seasonings. If needed, add 1/8 tsp. salt. Use at room temperature.



# LOX AND BAGELS CHOPPED SALAD

Serves 4 as a main course

1 clove garlic

1 recipe chopped salad base (see recipe above)

8 oz. thinly sliced lox or smoked salmon

1/4 cup drained capers, coarsely chopped

2 everything bagels

1 recipe cream cheese dressing (see below)

3 Tbs. sesame seeds or everything bagel seasoning mix

1 lemon, cut into wedges

Cut garlic in half and rub inside a large salad bowl.



Discard garlic. Add chopped salad base. Separate lox slices and cut into 1/2-inch pieces. Toss lox and capers with salad mix. Cut bagels into 1/2-inch cubes and toast in oven for croutons. Just before serving, toss salad with croutons, dressing, and seeds. Serve lemon wedges on the side.

Cream cheese dressing: Using a fork, blend until smooth 1 cup whipped cream cheese (at room temperature) with 1/3 cup lemon juice, 1/2 cup grapeseed or other neutral oil and 1/4 cup water. Stir in 1/2 tsp. each salt and ground black pepper. Use at room temperature.
